

CAMDEN NEWS NOTES

** Mayor Ellis yesterday appointed Louis Hammel a policeman to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Isaac Toy.

** The Commercial Club has elected these officers. President, Jacob Daubman; vice-president, J. S. Gallagher; recording secretary, F. H. Goodfellow; financial secretary, Charles M. Baldwin; treasurer, Philip Wilson.

** The grand jury were the guests of Superintendent Currie, at Blackwood, yesterday.

** Friends of Giovanni Cancelli, the Italian sentenced to twenty-five years in State Prison for shooting to death Dominic Mercurio, have retained counsel to have the case reopened by Judge Garrison.

** Camden trolley men are now receiving nineteen cents per hour, an increase of two cents over the old rate. This new schedule went into effect on New Year's Day and was a compromise with the men who asked for twenty cents an hour.

** After hanging fire for nearly a year the quo warranto proceedings instituted against Councilman-at-Large Joseph Potter by Councilman W. H. Kensinger, to test the right of the former to a seat in Camden City Council, have been dismissed.

** The Camden City Medical Society has advocated the establishment of a municipal hospital for the treatment of contagious diseases.

** Acting on the order of Chief Gravenor, the Camden police yesterday made a round of the various junk shops and second-hand places where the proprietors were warned against purchasing any articles from persons under 18 years of age. This was done to prevent many youthful thieves disposing of plunder.
