

CAMDEN'S NEWS BUDGET.

Joe Hillman's Father Causes the Arrest of a Young Man for Assault.

Isaac Toy, a well-known semi-professional base ball player of Camden, was committed to jail by Justice Cassady yesterday on the charge of assault and battery on Ephraim Hillman. The latter is the father of Joseph Hillman, who was recently hung at Woodbury for murdering the peddler Seideman. Hillman yesterday visited the wife of the murderer, who is stopping at the house of Samuel Thomas, at Fifth and Bridge avenue. He wanted to take his little grandson out to buy him some candy. To this Mrs. Hillman objected. Hillman was determined to take the child and a general row ensued between him and the women folks of the house. Toy, who was near by, took a hand, and, it is alleged, hit Hillman. Later in the day Hillman caused a sensation at the court house by trying to gain an entrance to the room to witness the murder trial. The fact that he was the father of the boy murderer of Woodbury soon became known and the spectators who were in the corridor craned their necks to see him.
